The Most Reverend and Right Honourable Justin Welby – The Archbishop of Canterbury

My dear sisters and brothers in Christ.

It is a source of great joy that you have journeyed from around the Anglican Communion to be part of this historic occasion in Canterbury. Many of you have also taken part in online meetings during 2021-22, as part of our prayers and preparations for the event. Thank you for your fellowship and time.

Two years ago, we could hardly have believed the course of world events that was about to unfold with the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic. This, along with the ongoing challenges like the climate emergency, war and conflict in many countries and the huge inequalities of our world, continue to have a deep impact on us all.

As we gather for the fifteenth Lambeth Conference, the privilege and responsibility of meeting feels even more significant.

The business of this conference is to discern the Holy Spirit's directing in what it means to be 'God's Church for God's World', as we seek to 'walk, listen and witness together.'

We are living at a time where there is much to fragment and divide the world – but Christ calls his Church to be one in witness and in worship so that Jesus is presented to the world.

That is why the conference's Biblical focus on the First Epistle of Peter is so important.

Then and now, 1 Peter calls the church beyond the power dynamics of the world, to live holy lives rooted in the servanthood of Christ.

This once-a-decade meeting plays a vital role in the life of the Anglican Communion, providing time and space for bishops to meet, share fellowship and pray.



These meetings have been an important space for sharing our life together in Christ through prayer, relationship building and preparation – and we thank all of you that took part.

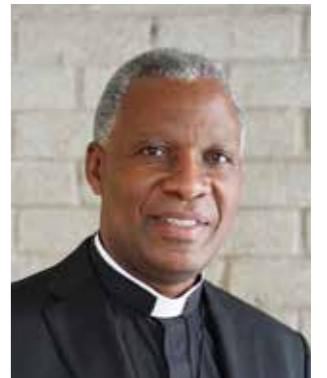
As we gather for the full conference, our prayer is that our fellowship, prayer and listening to God and one another will continue, as we share our stories and learn from each other.


The words of 1 Peter inspire us, as God's people, to serve with the strength God supplies.

Perhaps we can help by listening to your concerns and sharing some encouragement or praying with and for you.



Event Purpose

Convened by The Most Reverend Justin Welby, The Archbishop of Canterbury, The Lambeth Conference is an international gathering of Anglican bishops.

The conference provides space for the bishops from all around the globe to meet for prayer, Bible study and community. The bishops also spend time in dialogue on matters of common concern in church and world affairs.

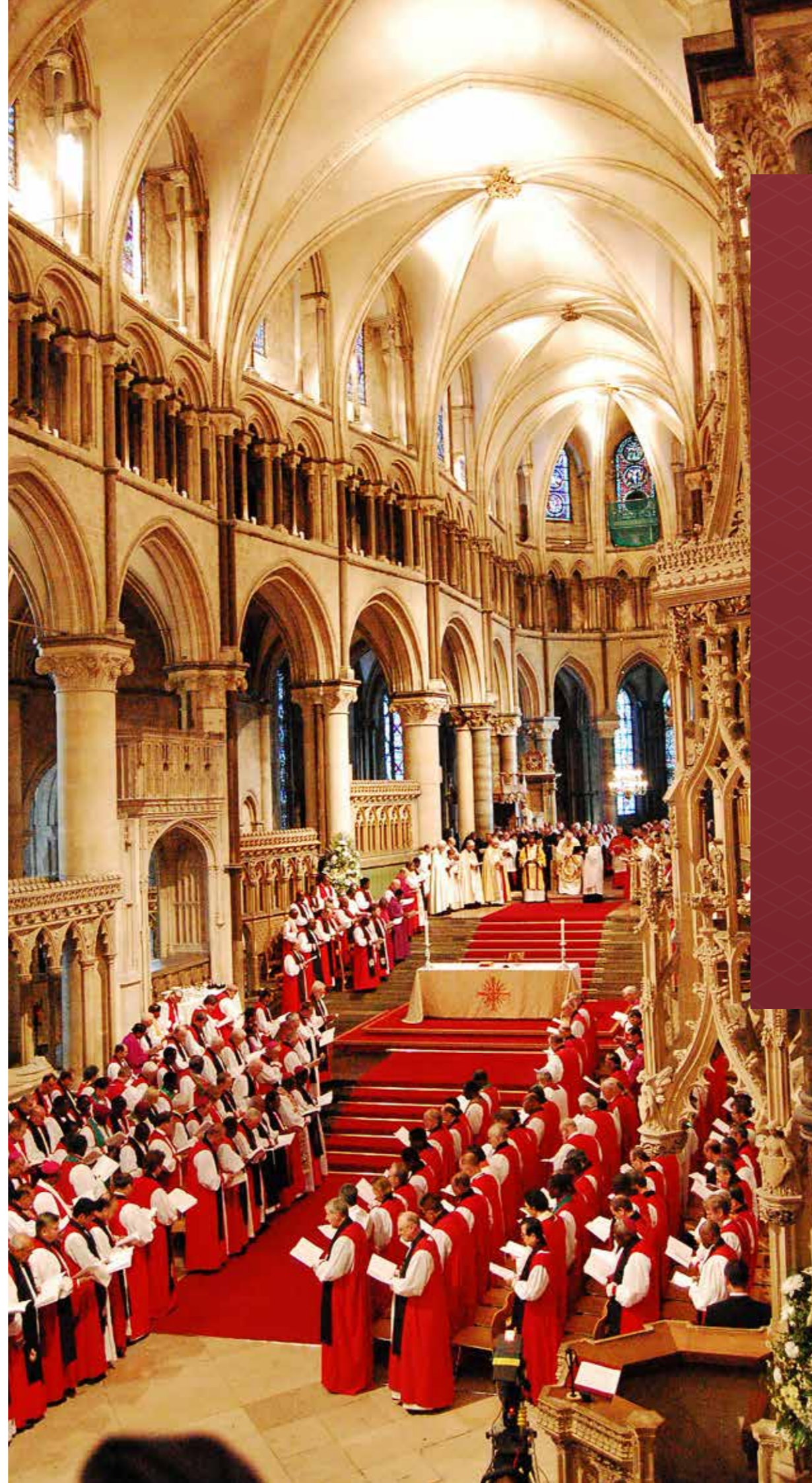
With the theme of 'God's church for God's World' the conference will explore what it means for the Anglican Communion to respond to the needs of a needs of a 21st century world.

The conference will equip bishops from around the world to understand one another's contexts and work together for the common good.

In 2022 the Lambeth Conference is running as a joint conference. For much of the conference bishops and spouses will be together, with some time spent in separate sessions during the retreats, Bible Studies and Lambeth Calls.

Creating lasting outcomes

The fifteenth Lambeth Conference is different to previous conferences in that it is the first conference to operate in three phases:



Phase 1 Walking Together:

Before the full conference, bishops have been meeting together for online conversations about themes relevant to the conference.



Phase 2 Listening Together:

The full event in Canterbury in July-August 2022, where delegates will meet for continued conversation, prayer and listening together.



Phase 3 Witnessing Together:

After the conference, outcomes from the bishops' conversations are shared, and further action taken around the Anglican Communion. Lambeth Calls will be an integral part of the implementation phase.

Programme Overview: Key Themes and Features of the Event

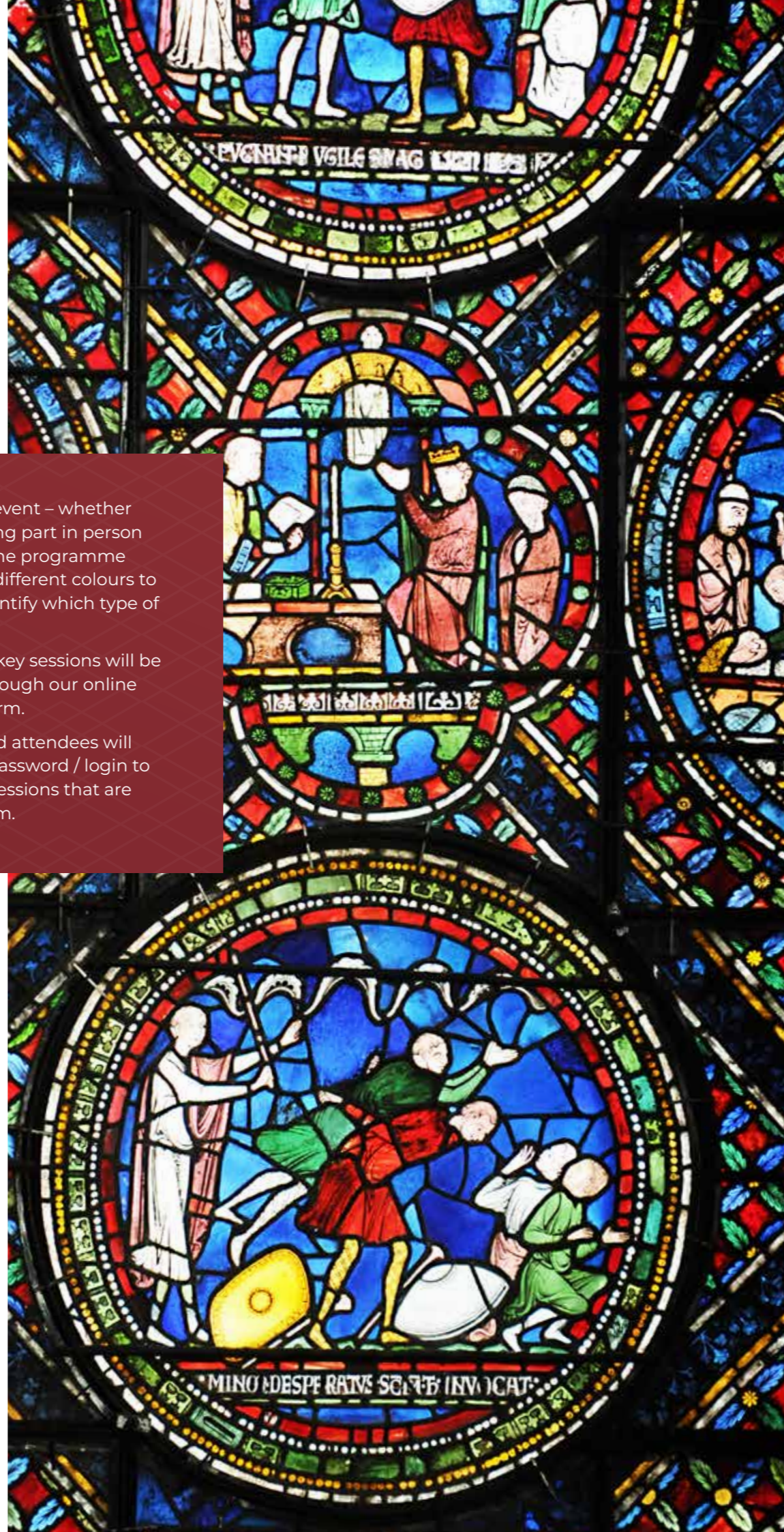
The Lambeth Conference programme will be built around different types of sessions:

- The retreats - bishops and spouses meet separately
- Morning and Night Prayer
- Eucharist and Evening Prayer
- Services at Canterbury Cathedral
- Bible expositions
- Bible study groups on the First Epistle of Peter
- Plenary sessions on main conference themes
- 'Lambeth Calls' discussions
- Keynote addresses from the Archbishop of Canterbury
- A day at Lambeth Palace in London
- Spouses Strengthening Sessions (when Lambeth Call sessions are running)
- Seminars
- Some evening specific group meetings
- An evening programme of light entertainment

During the event – whether you are taking part in person or online – the programme will feature different colours to help you identify which type of session it is.

Most of the key sessions will be available through our online event platform.

All registered attendees will be given a password / login to access the sessions that are open to them.



Ecumenicals

Lambeth Conferences have been enriched over the years by the presence of representatives from other Christian churches and communions.

During the conference, we are delighted that several Ecumenical participants will be with us. Our sisters and brothers will join us for prayer, worship and bible study, and will observe and take part in discussions as they take place. In this way we, as Anglicans, realise that we are part of the wider body of Christ.

We are pleased to welcome representatives from non-Anglican churches with which we are in communion; from churches and Christian World Communions with which the Anglican Communion is engaged in ecumenical dialogue and from other major denominations and international ecumenical bodies.

The Retreats (28-29 July)

The conference starts for bishops and spouses with times in retreat for spiritual reflection and prayer.

The bishops' retreat

The bishops' retreat will be held at Canterbury Cathedral.

The retreat will include the daily offices and opening addresses on each of the chapters of 1 Peter. There will also be time for reflection either in silence or in small groups with other bishops.

The bishops will have the full use of the cathedral and grounds (which will not be open to the public on the retreat days).

The spouses' retreat

The spouses' retreat will be hosted at the University of Kent, and will be the formal start of the spouses' programme together.

This will be an important time for spouses to meet and start to get to know one another.

The days of the retreat will focus on being 'Born into a Living Hope' and 'Called by Name, Known and Loved'.

Daily Offices and Chapel Spaces

Worship will play a key part in framing the whole of the conference. The services have been planned by the Chaplaincy Team under the leadership of Bishop Nigel Stock, chaplain to the conference, working with colleagues at Canterbury Cathedral.

The Chaplaincy Team will be on hand to support these services and a Pastoral Team made up of members of religious communities from around the Anglican Communion will be available to bishops and spouses who would welcome a pastoral conversation.

Daily Offices

Morning Eucharists and Evening Prayer – Venue 1

The Eucharist and Evening Prayer will be led by different provinces of the Anglican Communion, supported by the Chaplaincy Team.

These services will take place in Venue 1. In place of a homily the provinces will offer a short visual presentation on what it means to follow Jesus Christ in their context today.

Prayer and chapel spaces at the University of Kent

Morning Prayer and Night Prayer, led by the Community of St Anselm, will take place in the chapel, which will be situated in the Kennedy Building.

Morning Prayer

A reflective service following the pattern used daily at Lambeth Palace based on the Church of England liturgy. The service includes sung elements, readings, psalms and prayers. Parts of the service will be in different languages reflecting the international nature of the conference and the Community of St. Anselm.

Night Prayer

Adapted from the final Benedictine office of Compline, this contemplative service includes a short reading, psalms, simple sung elements and prayers. It includes spaces for intentional silence to allow reflection upon the day.

Personal prayer space

Two spaces will be available throughout the conference for personal prayer.

The Chapel

Open daily for prayer. The chapel is on the ground floor of the Kennedy Building at the heart of the University of Kent, Canterbury (UKC) site.

Creative prayer space

Adjacent to the Chapel is a creative prayer room available daily. The space is stocked with various materials and tools to enable and encourage intercessions for the church and the world through creative processes. Members of the Community of St. Anselm will maintain the space and be available to assist throughout the conference.

Services at Canterbury Cathedral

Services for the conference community will be at Canterbury Cathedral on the following dates:

Sunday 31 July

10:00 Opening Eucharist

Sunday 7 August

16:00 Closing Eucharist

There are also a number of daily services at Canterbury Cathedral, open to the conference community. These are public services, run by the cathedral.

07:30 Morning Prayer

08:00 Daily Eucharist

17:30 Evening Prayer



Bible Expositions and Bible Studies: The First Epistle of Peter

As the Lambeth Conference explores the theme of being 'God's Church for God's World', the Biblical focus for the event will be the First Epistle of Peter.

Hosted by The Archbishop of Canterbury, five mornings of the conference will be devoted to Bible expositions on 1 Peter, followed by Bible Study groups.

The commentary on the First Epistle of Peter

An official conference commentary on 1 Peter has been developed with contributions from an international group of 35 New Testament scholars from Anglican and other churches around the world, who gathered in Lambeth Palace in November 2018 for the St Augustine Seminar.

The scholars represent a range of Christian traditions and experiences, from Australia, Botswana, Brazil, Canada, China, Colombia, Egypt, India, Ireland, Kenya, Nigeria, the Philippines, Singapore, South Africa, Switzerland, the UK, and the US.

The commentary was edited by Canon Professor Jenn Strawbridge, who convened the Saint Augustine Seminar. Jenn is the Associate Professor in New Testament Studies at Mansfield College in the University of Oxford.

The work of the St Augustine Seminar and the resources it has produced have all been funded by St Augustine's Foundation. This is a charitable grant-making body which is linked to Canterbury Cathedral. It exists to support theological education and development in the Anglican Communion.

The First Epistle of Peter is a personal favourite of mine. There is so much in it that is pertinent for the Church, for the world, for the times we are living in and for us as we seek direction for the Anglican Communion in the years ahead. It's a book that raises an utterly compelling and inspiring vision of God's kingdom. It raises our eyes beyond the immediacy of our struggles and differences. It urges us to hear a far deeper call. Through our faith in Jesus Christ, Peter encourages us to live lives of witness, hope and holiness as God's chosen people.

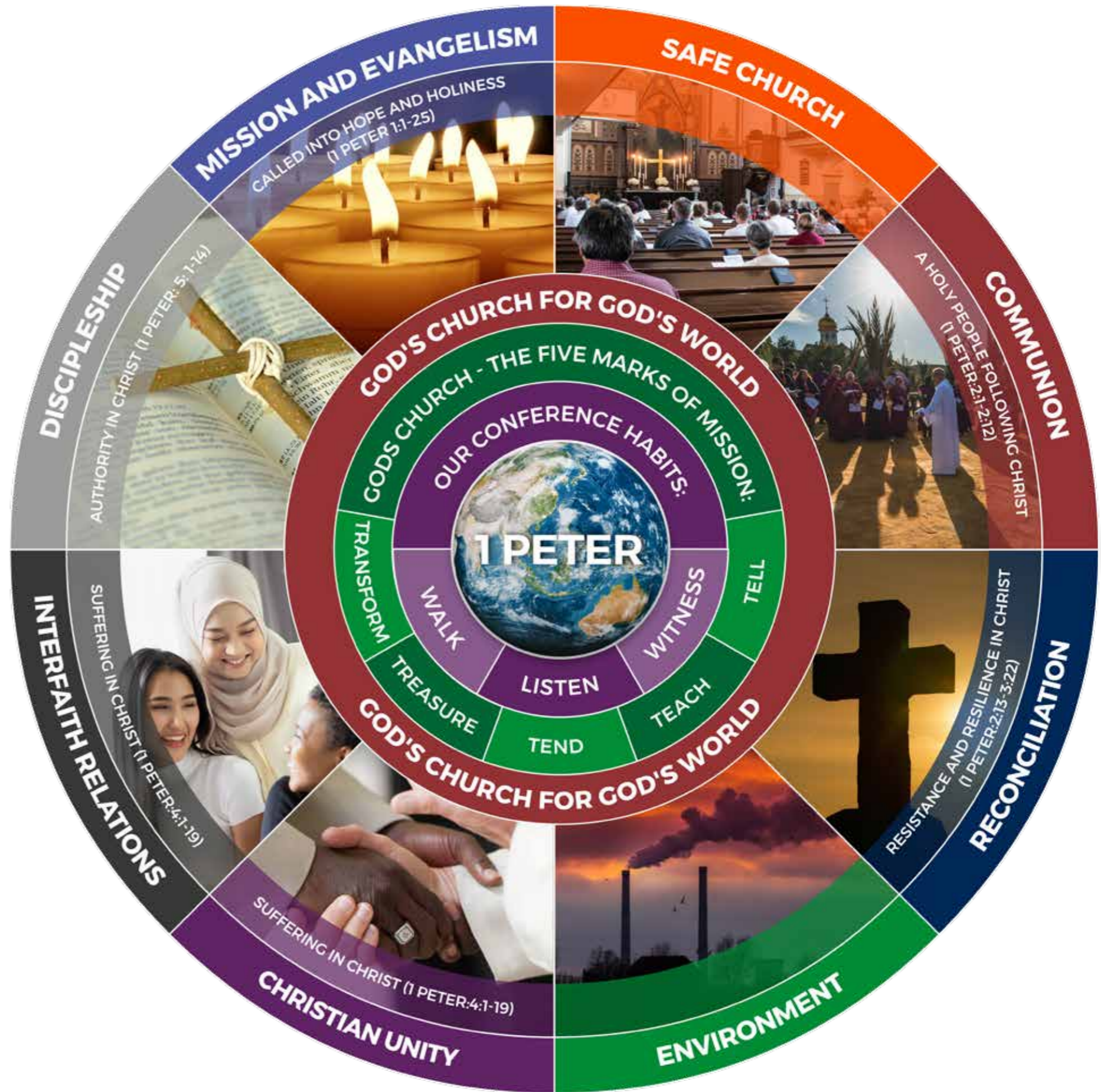
Plenary Themes

Flowing out from the Bible exposition on 1 Peter, the conference will meet for plenary sessions on major themes in church and world affairs. Plenaries will involve speakers and special guests from around the world.

The themes for the plenary sessions are:

- Safe Church
- Anglican Identity
- Reconciliation
- Christian Unity
- The Environment and Sustainable Development (during the day at Lambeth Palace)
- Inter Faith Relations
- Discipleship
- The Decade Ahead

Lambeth Calls: The Bishops' Conversations in 2022

'Lambeth Call' discussions will follow on from each plenary theme at the conference.

'Lambeth Calls' is the name being given to describe shared declarations, affirmations and calls to the church being shared by bishops that are taking part in the Lambeth Conference in 2022.

Lambeth Calls will start in discussion and be shared from the conference in a short paper. They will be clear statements, outlining ways in which the Anglican Communion might collectively seek to be "God's Church for God's World" in the decade ahead.

They will invite churches and communities around the world to add their voices to Lambeth Calls.

The focus of each Lambeth Call is to deepen faithfulness to God, advance the ministry of the Communion and enable wider participation in the calls by churches and communities around the world.

The aim is to ensure the Lambeth Calls are progressed by the Provinces of the Anglican Communion. The other Instruments of the Communion will be involved in the ongoing work of the Conference, with reports on what progress has been made at the ACC when it meets in 2023.

Spouses will be in their own sessions during Lambeth Calls.

Keynote Addresses from The Archbishop of Canterbury

The Archbishop of Canterbury will address the Lambeth Conference in Bible exposition discussions and also through three keynote addresses.



Keynote 1:

God's Church for God's World: A 21st century world needs a 21st century church

What does it mean for the church to be good news today? An address to the conference on the contemporary challenges and themes of our world in the context of theology and mission.

Keynote 2:

God's Church for God's World: Living in the world as a Christian

The Anglican Communion is present in 165 countries, with millions of Christians worldwide. How do we engage with our culture without being consumed by it? An address to the conference on what it means to share the hope of the gospel in a challenging world.

Keynote 3:

God's Church for God's World: Going into the world and living out our mission as the Anglican Communion

An address to the conference on the Anglican Communion's Five Marks of mission (Tell, Teach, Tend, Transform and Treasure). Looking to the decade ahead, how can we encourage our churches and communities to carry out the five marks of mission in their contexts?

The Environment and Sustainable Development – a Day at Lambeth Palace

The Church has a vital role to play in protecting God’s beautiful creation and promoting human well-being, as expressed in the Anglican Marks of Mission.

The conference will visit Lambeth Palace in London for a day of prayer, reflection, and action on the environment and sustainable development. The conference community will be invited to take part in the launch of the Anglican Communion Forest.





The Seminars

There will be a number of seminar options for bishops and spouses during the Lambeth Conference, presented by a wide range of contributors from around the world.

Learn about ministry in other contexts, and discuss important issues impacting church life and our world today.

Delegates will be able to choose one seminar out of the list available each day. All bishops are encouraged to attend the seminar on Safe Church which will be offered each day when seminars are running.

Seminars will happen on the days listed below.

Seminars Day 3: Saturday 6 August

The Evening Programme

Old Palace receptions

During the course of the conference all bishops and spouses will be invited to supper with the Archbishop of Canterbury and Mrs Welby hosted at the Old Palace in Canterbury. Delegates will receive an invitation confirming arrangements for the date they are invited to attend, and transportation will be provided.

Canterbury Cathedral – evening pilgrimages

An opportunity to walk with a group in stillness around the Cathedral at dusk, guided by one of its clergy. The pilgrimage provides an opportunity to reflect prayerfully upon our history and the life of the Communion and the world today. The group will stop at some of the significant places in the Cathedral – like the spot where Archbishop Becket was murdered, and in the 11th century Crypt.

Spaces on these tours are limited and you will need to sign up at the help desk in the Sibson building. Transport to and from the Cathedral will be provided however, as the pilgrimage entails climbing uneven steps in dim lighting, good mobility is required.

Evening receptions

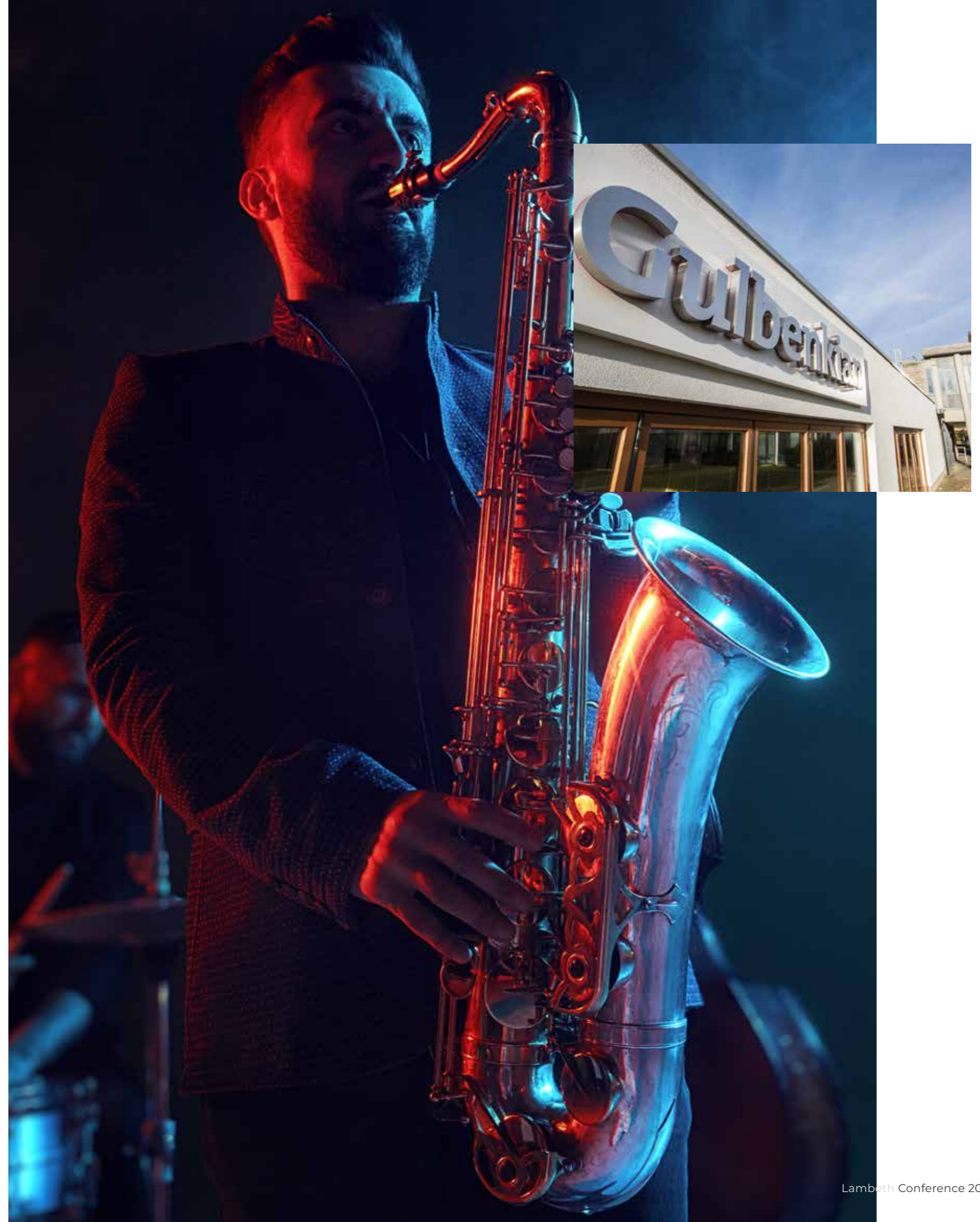
There will be some evening receptions which are events that are hosted by bishops. This is a mixture of invitation only events, dinner receptions or drinks receptions. The events that are open to all are featured in the conference programme.

Evening relaxation and entertainment

There will be a mixture of entertainment and relaxation events for conference delegates in the evenings, ranging from concerts, dance performances, informal prayer and praise, amongst other things, all taking place in the Gulbenkian Arts Centre. Please refer to the conference programme to see what is happening on which day.

Social spaces

The K-Bar on campus will be available for delegates to socialise and purchase drinks. The Commonwealth Games will be streamed on the screens in the K-Bar. The K-Lounge will also be available as a non-alcoholic space. Both of these areas are situated in the Keynes building. The Gulbenkian Arts Centre also has a bar and foyer area where there will be live background music on some evenings.



The Spouses' Programme

The Spouses' Programme

About the Spouses' programme

The Lambeth Conference 2022 is a joint conference for bishops and spouses.

The spouses will join the bishops for Bible expositions, plenaries, cathedral services, eucharist, morning, evening and night time prayer, and the Archbishop of Canterbury's keynote addresses.

The spouses' programme also includes some separate sessions, including a retreat, Bible studies, plenary seminars and strengthening sessions.

All times and sessions are listed in the full programme timetable, but here is a guide on what to expect.

The Spouses' venues

Venue 1 and 2

Spouses will join bishops in Venue 1 for some sessions. Others, for spouses only, will be in Venue 2 (The Sports Centre) and other spaces around the campus.

The Spouses' Marquee

The marquee is a special space available for spouses to take time out from the busyness of the conference and to enjoy being together.

The spouses' marquee will be open from 11:00 to 17:00 on ordinary conference days. Refreshments will be available and a number of craft activities will be on offer.

As well as comfortable seating inside the marquee, spouses will have access to outside seating with views over Canterbury.

Members of the Pastoral Team will be on hand for conversation or to support with prayer requests.

The Spouses' Retreat (28-29 July)

The Spouses' retreat is hosted at the University of Kent. Each day begins with a session in Venue 2 (The Sports Centre) with plenary input and discussion in table groups.

The retreat will include acts of worship with songs and liturgy and will conclude with a Eucharist. Canon Paula Gooder from St Paul's Cathedral will guide reflection on the themes of 'Called by Name' and 'Known and Loved'.

During the retreat, spouses will be seated in groups together with the people who will be their Bible study group for the conference.

A number of optional workshops will be offered across two sessions. These will include music and singing, creative writing, oral storytelling, prayer and the gift of tears, ignatian meditation, testimony in paint, a local walk around Canterbury, a woodland walk or forest bathing. Full workshop details are listed on Thursday 28 July in the daily schedule.

Members of the Pastoral Team will be available for those who would like spiritual direction or a pastoral conversation.

Bible Expositions and Bible Studies

On ordinary conference days, spouses are encouraged to attend the morning Bible exposition in the main venue. This will be followed by time in Bible study groups for spouses.



Strengthening Sessions

Choose your session

During the conference, a special series of sessions has been planned for spouses under the title **'Strengthening Sessions'**. These will be for spouses only and will take place when the bishops are considering the Lambeth Calls.

The aim for these sessions is that they should be fun, energising and interactive. Bringing together a mix of spiritual reflection, personal experience and new truths and insights.

They are called strengthening sessions because they are about encouraging everyone's contribution, leadership and gifts. It's about providing a space for spouses to be open with one another.

As well as being designed for spouses to play an active role at the conference, the strengthening sessions are in a format that could be used with groups in home settings.

Each session will point to practical resources and tools that can be used after the event, to support ongoing learning and to encourage others to bring hope and help to individuals, families, communities and the church.

Session choices

There are twelve sessions in all – under three streams:

Stream 1: Personal Wholeness

Stream 2: Leadership

Stream 3: Community Action

Spouses will be able to attend up to four sessions from the list of twelve and can either choose to follow all the sessions in one theme or to choose the ones that seem most relevant to you. The conference timetable will indicate when one of these choices is available.

Strengthening Sessions

Stream 1:

Personal Wholeness

Who am I?

This session explores our sense of self as spouses, male or female, and is especially relevant to those new to being a Bishop's spouse. We reflect on what it means to be 'Called by name' and 'Known and loved' in the context in which I find myself. How to gain confidence in who God created me to be, without needing to fit anyone's mould.

The dynamics of the spouse's role

We explore our feelings about juggling so many public and private roles. Some gain a leadership role alongside our spouse and others support them in different ways. We reflect on how we can balance our different roles, the expectations on us as spouses, and how we use power in the spouse's role. We share suggestions of what helps us cope.

Safe spaces: changing our future

This session helps us surface hidden attitudes, beliefs and some of the harmful practices that take place in our families, church and community. We reflect on the roots of our behaviour and explore our role as agents of change so we ensure greater safety for our children and others who are vulnerable.

Journeying with hope in an age of uncertainty

These last two years have battered us in many and unexpected ways. We can be in the midst of people but still feel isolated and vulnerable. We explore practical ways we can stay connected – and how we can support each other's personal wellbeing. How do we maximise the resources God gives us and nurture ourselves and each other? How do we sing a song of hope in a strange land?

Strengthening Sessions

Stream 2:

Leadership

Foundations for leadership

We reflect on the character of a leader, exploring what it means to be people of integrity who demonstrate courage and humility. We share Biblical role models who inspire us. We learn from them and each other how God can use our failures and restore and sustain us as we offer our gifts to Him.

Leading and involving others

Many of us have to lead, formally or informally, in our families or in programmes/ projects, but it can feel like we are dragging a rock up a mountain. This session gives us a taste of the attitudes and activities that can enable us to lead and encourage others to share responsibility, including the vulnerable and left-out.

Running an effective event or meeting

How can we plan, run and structure meetings or events effectively, ensuring that everyone is involved and that we make decisions which everyone understands? How can we ensure good documentation and follow-up? We will all share experience and learning.

Managing inter-personal conflict: Navigating disagreement

We all encounter conflict and it never feels comfortable, but we do not need to be paralysed by it. Jesus' example shows us that we can respond to disagreement with curiosity and generosity, without compromising our convictions. In fact, sometimes conflict can be an opportunity to deepen and strengthen relationships in ways we never imagined. This session enables us to reflect on how Jesus and others deal with division and share how we can respond with hope and confidence.

Strengthening Sessions

Stream 3:

Community Action

Foundations for community action

This session will help us in the activities we are already doing in our communities. We share together learning from the Bible and from each other's experience how to make these activities even more effective and lasting.

What difference do we make?

It is important to focus from the beginning on the end difference we want to make, so our efforts produce mindset change and lead to lasting impact. This session reflects on why evaluating and learning is vital for our Christian accountability and stewardship. We look at how we can do it in a simple and relevant way with local churches and groups.

Exploring community needs

It can be easy to do what 'feels right', rather than first understanding what is needed and ensuring genuine transformation. This session shows effective approaches that the church worldwide is using to listen, identify and prioritise needs, then act together with its communities to tackle those issues. It gives experience of practical tools that can help us in this process.

Peace and reconciliation

Inspiring stories and learning from those who are making a difference in conflict affected places and where we are all facing it in our own lives. This session enables us to explore what works and how we can go back with practical ways to make a difference in our communities.

Plenary Sessions for Spouses

Day 7, Tuesday 2 August

Building Resilience seminar,

Spouses will have an opportunity at the mid-point of the conference to come together as one group to look at the challenges that we face in our personal lives, family lives, church and wider community. As well as offering these challenges to God, the seminar will enable spouses to share examples of resilience in the face of challenge, as well as practical coping strategies to encourage one another.

Day 11, Saturday 6 August

'What are we taking forward?'

This final plenary session for spouses is intended to provide space to reflect on what we have received from the conference as individuals and as a group. Is there something that we want to commit to as we return home, either for ourselves or for others? How can we continue to support, encourage and pray for one another as we move forward?

Special Project Focus – Days for Girls

During the Lambeth Conference, the spouses' programme will have a special project focus: Days for Girls.

Days for Girls work to increase access to menstrual care and education by developing global partnerships, cultivating Social Entrepreneurs, mobilizing volunteers and innovating sustainable solutions that shatter stigma and limitations for women and girls.

Alongside the printed programme, the online event platform shares daily schedules and other information about the conference programme.

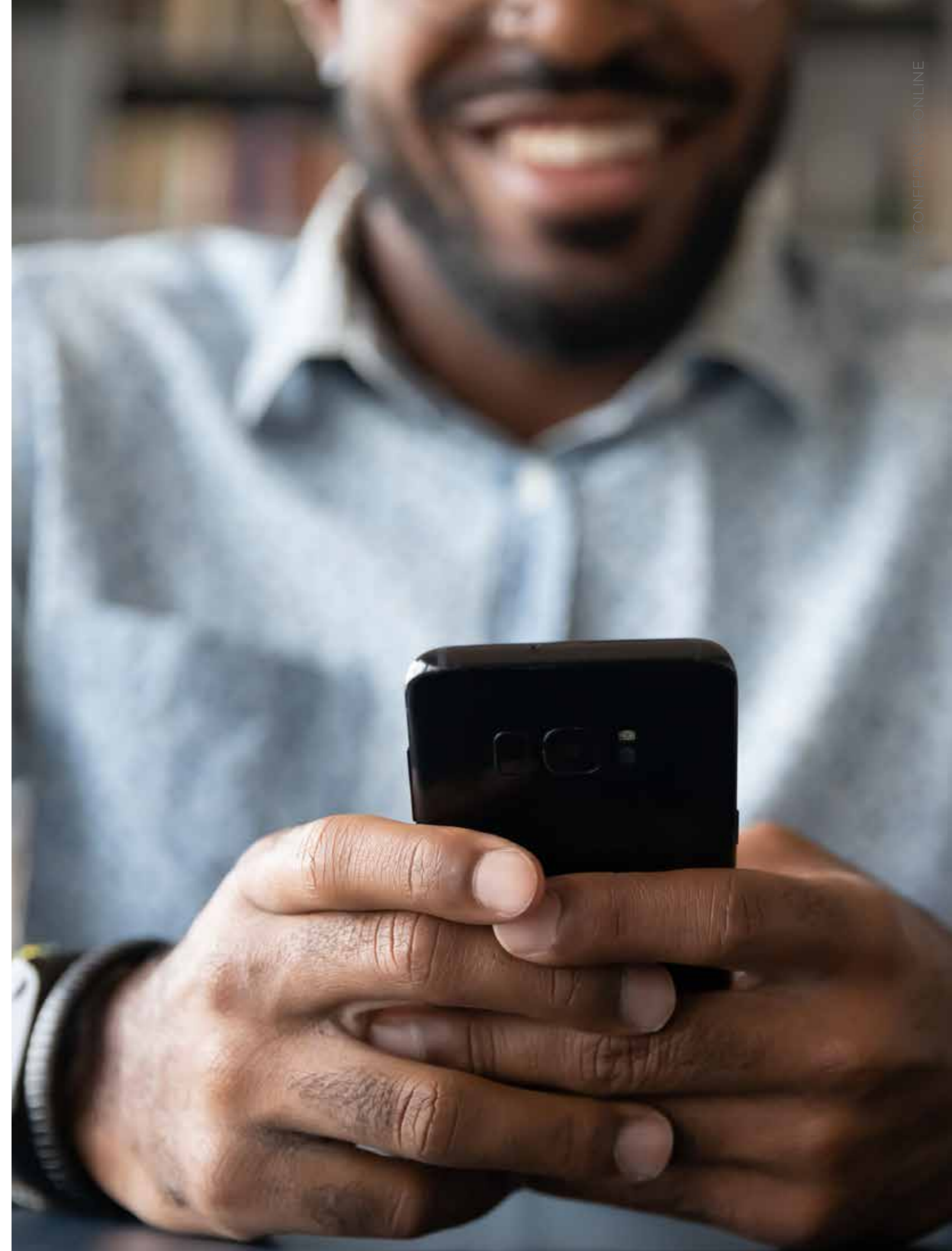
Whether on site, or following the conference from a different location, this is available throughout the event, for all our registered delegates.

Our Conference Habits

One of the huge blessings of the Lambeth Conference is its diversity of cultures, languages, Christian traditions, ideas and perspectives.

With people invited from 165 countries of the Anglican Communion, our 12-day conference provides an amazing opportunity to learn from one another, share and receive each other's story.

As we journey through the Lambeth Conference, we invite you to celebrate this diversity and respect one another. You may choose to practice these habits and a shared commitment to walk, listen and witness together.

- **Walk together** by being present and being prepared to encounter others with authenticity and confidence. Make time for others, dedicate your full attention to them and encounter them as they are. Notice complexity, difference and division – daring to find unexpected points of connection.
- **Listen together** by being curious, listening to others stories and attempting to see the world through their eyes. Listen with honesty, acknowledging that you don't have all the answers and with a curiosity about what God is doing.
- **Witness together** by reimagining a world where healing, restoration and thriving relationships are possible. Be honest when things are not as they should be but remember the story of what God has done and allow God to stretch your understanding of what is possible

As we embark upon conversations and dialogue we invite you to consider:

- **We all have different views of the world:** We all come from different cultures and are tempted to think 'our way is the best way' or, most damaging, 'our way is the only way.' Being attentive to these attitudes is essential in intercultural communication. We discover that our way is one way but not the only way.
- **The value of listening deeply:** The stories that form different cultures are gifts that reveal cultural identity. We listen to them with open hearts and minds and ask what another culture can learn from them.
- **The challenge to resist making assumptions:** It's so easy to make quick assumptions without knowing the full story. Resist the temptation to assume or make hasty comparisons about others.

Conduct

The Anglican Communion has a longstanding commitment to encourage a lifestyle and pattern of work that respects the dignity and worth of each individual irrespective of social status, ethnicity, colour, religion, gender, sexual orientation, age or disability.

The Bible affirms that women, men and children of all cultures, nations and religions are created equally in the image of God. Each human being has received his or her dignity as a gift of God. God calls us to show care and respect for every human being. The Lambeth Conference is committed to upholding the safety and dignity of all.

Facilities

The event will be supported by the University of Kent Hospitality Team. Here is some guidance on the facilities, for the duration of your stay.

Help Desk

The conference Help Desk will be in the Sibson Building during the event. Go to this reception desk for any event / programme related questions.

Accommodation

Conference delegates will be in single or double ensuite bedrooms.

Rooms will be cleaned daily, with linen and towels changed on Saturday 30 July and Thursday 4 August. Spare linen will be provided in each room for use if needed. Towels can be left on the floor if a change is required.

Food and drink

There are a number of cafes, bars and bistros on campus. Catering will be in a number of locations with breakfast venues being located close to where delegates are sleeping. There is more flexibility at lunch and evening meal times. Facilities to make tea and coffee will be provided in communal kitchens within accommodation blocks.

Lost property

Any lost property during the conference will be taken to the Help Desk at the Sibson Building. Please speak to the Help Desk team in Sibson if you have lost an item.

Health and medical support

There is a medical team onsite which will provide 24 hour emergency cover.

Getting around

The Lambeth Conference will be organising bus transportation at key times in the event. This will include buses to the Cathedral on the Retreat days, opening and closing services, Old Palace Receptions and the day at Lambeth Palace in London.

Car

Car parking within Canterbury can be limited at peak times and is pay and display. We recommend taking the bus into Canterbury for ease.

Free parking on the University site is available for conference delegates. All vehicles parking on site must display a parking pass. Delegate parking will be located in the Park Wood Courts car parks. Enquire at the Help Desk in Sibson building for details.

Train

Resource Centre

The Lambeth Conference Resource Centre will be an important part of this once-a-decade gathering of Anglican bishops.

Located at the heart of our conference village – the Resource Centre will be situated in a large marquee next door to Venue 1, where all of the main conference sessions and bishops' discussions will be taking place.

You will also be able to visit and engage with a large number of Anglican Commissions and networks, who will have their own dedicated area of the resource centre.

Language Service

The Lambeth Conference is committed to supporting each person's participation in the event. In order to ensure multilingual and cross cultural understanding, translation and interpretation services will be provided throughout the conference.

During the registration process, every event attendee was asked to provide information about their language needs. Based on that information, the Conference Planning Team and the Language Service have worked hard to provide the following translation and interpretation services:

Headsets – each delegate will be given a headset to borrow for the duration of the conference along with their conference badge when they register at the Help Desk in the Sibson building. You will need to bring your headset to each venue in order to listen to the interpretation in English and other languages, as many of the sessions will be multi-lingual. Please remember to switch the headsets off when you are not using them. At the end of the conference you will need to return the headset to the Help Desk. Delegates will be asked to sign for each headset, and any loss or damage will be the responsibility of the delegate.

- **Plenary sessions** will be simultaneously interpreted into French, Spanish, Portuguese, Japanese, Korean, Swahili, Juba Arabic and Burmese, including all Plenary sessions, Keynote Addresses, Bible expositions, Eucharist and Evening Prayer services. Every delegate will be given a receiver and headset on which they can select the language they wish to listen to during the sessions. In venue, where text projected on screen is in another language, English will also be shown. This is to ensure that the interpreters will interpret into the different languages.
- **The Bishops' and Spouses' Retreats** and the **opening and closing service in Canterbury Cathedral**, as well as the **addresses given on the day at Lambeth Palace** will also benefit from simultaneous interpretation.
- **Lambeth Calls sessions for Bishops** will have a combination of simultaneous interpretation for plenary inputs and consecutive interpretation to support table discussions.
- **Bible study groups** will either be monolingual or will be supported through consecutive interpretation.
- **Seminars** that take place in Venue 1 and 2 will have simultaneous interpretation into all eight languages. Delegates will be able to contribute to the seminars in these venues in their mother tongue (provided they speak in one of the eight languages covered as above).
- **Seminars and Spouses' Strengthening Sessions** in other venues will only have interpretation where it is indicated.
- **The Old Palace Receptions** will have interpreters attending who will be wearing a badge with the languages that they can support bishops and spouses in. Delegates will be able to approach the interpreters at the event in case of need.
- Translation of written materials will be provided in four languages as standard: English, French, Spanish and Portuguese. Documents relating to the Lambeth Calls, Bible study material and the Order of Services for the Cathedral services will also be translated into all eight languages.
- Other key documents will be translated into other languages beyond the four listed as needed. Documents that are issued during the conference relating to the Lambeth Calls, press conferences or otherwise will be translated within reasonable deadlines as needed.
- Where possible, some reports of the event may be published on the conference web site and other communication channels, in English initially, with translations following in relevant languages as soon as possible.

***Please note that, although all efforts are being made to ensure multilingual coverage of key events and activities during the conference, the interpreters will not be able to support delegates individually over meals or social times outside of the main working sessions. Should you need language assistance for any informal social event during the conference, please contact the Language Service (language.service@lambethconference.org) however we cannot guarantee interpretation for these events.**

Other sessions will remain closed to media, and all bishops' discussions and Lambeth Call sessions will be closed to bishops only.

The Conference Communications Team

We have a Conference Communications Team who will be on site to support the media during their reporting of the event. They will respond to different media requests coming in to the media centre and may approach conference delegates during the event to set up interviews.

The Communications Team may also invite different people to take part in media briefings and conferences held during the event.


